From Our Rector for June 2024

One of my favorite memories from visiting the Holy Land was a boat ride on the Sea of Galilee. The Sea of Galilee is known for being calm one moment and terrifying the next as the weather changes on a dime. One of the most powerful



stories we reflected on was the storm that threatened to swamp the boat with Jesus and the disciples in it.

And a great windstorm arose, and the waves were breaking into the boat, so that the boat was already filling. But he was in the stern, asleep on the cushion. And they woke him and said to him, "Teacher, do you not care that we are perishing?" And he awoke and rebuked the wind and said to the sea, "Peace! Be still!" And the wind ceased, and there was a great calm. He said to them, "Why are you so afraid? Have you still no faith?" And they were filled with great fear and said to one another, "Who then is this, that even the wind and the sea obey him?" (Mark 4:37-41).

My key takeaway from that story is that Jesus was in the boat with them. Even though they were terrified he slept calmly. This is the kind of trust that Jesus had in God the Father and calls us to have as well.

As a person who loves sailing, the words of St. Boniface always touches my heart. "The Church is like a great ship being pounded by the waves of life's different stresses. Our duty is not to abandon ship, but to keep her on her course". As I begin this new journey with you I want one thing to be absolutely clear: WE ARE IN THIS TOGETHER. There will be challenges ahead. There will be moments of stress and anxiety as we navigate change and invite the Holy Spirit to transform us as individuals and as a parish. But the good news is that no matter how the waves beat on us, no matter how hard the wind blows, Jesus is in the boat with us. And if Jesus is in the boat then we have nothing to fear. He is ready to say "Peace! Be Still" to anything that comes our way.

The other side of being in this together is that each of us has a part to play in the ministry of our parish and there are no small tasks. Everyone's contributions matter and we can't do it without you. It has been a pleasure to sit in on committee meetings for the various ministries of our parish and listen to people's energy and enthusiasm about what they are doing and what they hope to do in the future. I urge every member of our parish to pray about how God might be calling you to a deeper service to St. John's. I look forward to seeing the vision God has for St. John the Divine and how we will get there together.

European psychologists now say that a person isn't really washed up if the first three years of life didn't quite jell. Carl Jung defined personality as a growing process, not what one is, but what one can become.





Anticipatory Grief June 2024

Here is the thing about grief – though we think of it as something that happens after a death, it often begins long before death arrives. It can start as soon as we become aware that death is a likelihood. Once death is on the horizon, even just as a possibility, it is natural that we begin to grieve. Though this is different than the grief that follows a death, anticipatory grief can carry many of the symptoms of regular grief sadness, anger, isolation, forgetfulness, and depression. These complicated emotions are often coupled with the exhaustion that comes with being a caregiver or the stress of being left alone in battling addictions or terminal illnesses. In advance of a death, One can grieve the loss of person's abilities and independence, their loss of cognition, a loss of hope, loss of future dreams, loss of stability and security, loss of their identity and our own. Caring for them as they suffer takes an emotional toll on us. These things can contribute to a sense of relief when the death eventually comes, and a guilt that can come with that relief. We feel guilty for this relief, thinking it diminishes our love for the person. It doesn't, of course, but this relief can be a confusing feeling.

Things to remember when dealing with Anticipatory Grief: Accept that anticipatory grief is normal and you are not alone. Allow yourself to acknowledge that, though the person hasn't died, you are grieving. Seek out caregiver support groups so you can connect with others who understand the challenges you are facing, including anticipatory grief. As long as you are there for support, you are not giving up on a family member or friend. There comes a time where we often accept that an illness is terminal and that recovery is no longer a possibility. Though it is reality, there can be a feeling of guilt that comes with that acceptance. But. In actuality, you are shifting your energy from hope for

recovery to hope for meaningful, comfortable time together. Take care of yourself. Finally, when someone dies there can be a sense of relief that is completely normal, but that can also create feelings of guilt. It is a normal reaction after a stressful and overwhelming time in your life.

Just because your loss was an anticipated loss, do not assume this will either speed up or slow down your grief after the death. It has been said it before and will be said again: we all grieve differently.

The Grief Support Group at Saint John Divine offers more than just discussions for those who have lost someone. Grief is a natural process. It isn't a disorder or an illness. You may be grieving about anything you've lost, whether it's a loved one or a job or something that had meaning for you. We meet every month on the 2nd and 4th Monday at10:00 AM in the Dons Room in the Banner building. When you feel the need, we can be there for you.

Treasurer's Update

Last January at the annual meeting, I explained the financial status of SJD, noted that the budgeted projected deficit for 2024 was (\$128,000) even with proposed staff reductions and stated that the only way for SJD to become financially sound would be to increase donations and reduce expenses.

At that meeting, the "Step-Up" initiative to increase donations was started. I am pleased to report that many parishioners did step up and through April 2024 donations increased by 24% compared to the same period in 2023. The donations for all of 2023 were \$340,000. A goal of \$400,000 was established for all of 2024 as part of the step up initiative. Through April, SJD is on pace to reach that goal!

On the expense side, there was another payroll reduction that brought the projected deficit for 2024 down to (\$98,000).

Parishioners have also been industrious by increasing revenue through the thrift store and bake sales which have generated \$20,000 in income through April 2024. Please continue to support these and upcoming fundraising opportunities and consider giving of your time and talent to help make them a reality.

If revenues continue at this pace through the balance of 2024, I am confident that the actual deficit for 2024 will be less than (\$50,000) - substantially less than the (\$220,000) deficit in 2023 (when we only had a rector for 2 months) and the (\$350,000) operating deficit in 2022 (when the rector was paid for 12 months).

While we have made great strides towards financial stability - where our revenues at least equal our expenses will take time. Casting a new vision for St. John's mission and ministry in our community will only come through all our efforts.


DIVINE JEWELRY SHOP

Reducing your tax burden when you give!

Last month I discussed Required Minimum Distributions or RMDs for those that have tax deferred accounts and are age 73 or older, and the impact withdrawls have on their taxable income level.

This month, I want to discuss you younger folks that are 70 1/2 and older, and if chartable giving is part of your financial plan, you can further your philanthropic goals and help reduce the tax hit from you RMD. You can make a qualified chartable distribution (QCD). Previous QCSs were limited to \$100,000 per year, but that amount is now indexed for inflation; for 2024, the QCD limit has increased to \$105,000.

QCDs don't count as income - meaning you can't deduct the contribution on your tax return - but their tax benefits could outweigh those of donating cash or other assets to charity, by reducing your total taxable income.

Please consider St. John the Divine Episcopal Church as part of your financing giving, whether as your annual pledge or gift; truly a loving way to support SJD and give thanks for the grace God has given us. Again, I would be happy to answer any questions a parishioner might have regarding any of the methods of giving to SJD or just in reducing your federal tax load. Also, if you have a financial advisor, I would highly recommend you discuss RMDs or QCDs with that person.
